Shannon has produced a series of vivid abstracts with effective use of an innovative texture technique but is in danger of becoming a prisoner through overuse.

Her bold colour is powerful and in some cases a bit overwhelming, especially the large areas of vibrant red. I did prefer the more subdued colour palette of Plus Five, a diptych, more refined and easier on the eye.

In contrast were a series of works titled Cerebellum, These paintings showed a far more intellectual approach, with good colour, shape and line co-ordination, aptly interpreting the brain's ability to regulate complex voluntary movement.


